Dear Parents and Carers.

Compared to how eventful last week was in school, this week has been significantly quieter!

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SATs focus:

This week, I have been looking at the arrangements for the SATs which take place each year in May. As we have a number of SEND learners in each year group, Year 6 is no different and so there is a lot of work to be done in order to ensure that every child feels fully supported and able to do their best.

What does this look like?

At Highley, children sit their SATs in the hall, in classrooms and in quiet offices, depending on what their needs are. Some children are allocated extra time for tests, or a scribe (an adult who will write their responses for them). Other children need access to rest breaks if they feel anxious or worried or perhaps need reminders to focus during the tests. It is really important that we get the provision right for these children and, if you were to walk through Hitchens and Wrekin at the moment, you would feel the 'buzz' as children are getting excited about the improvements they are making. It may seem like they are doing lot of work but I can confirm that the children are getting extra time outside and getting excited about their plans for after SATs.

Other SEND news:

I was delighted to sit down with Polly from Spectra (a service that specialises in helping children with their social and communication needs) this week. She was really impressed with the work that we are doing with Zones of Regulation and the fact that children could explain to her how they can move from the 'red' zone to the 'green' zone so that they feel calm and ready to learn.

She also noted how calm our corridors are and that we have spaces for children to regulate their emotions as needed. Our Community Mentors who visit school and provide informal nurture to some of our children have also commented upon this and how sensibly our KS2 children use this space now.

It is great being at Highley School, particularly when the sun shines!

A Quick Guide To Head lice

Symptoms & Detection

The main symptom is an itchy scalp. Children may hardly notice head lice or may have only minor scalp irritation.

Move a fine tooth comb through wet hair from the scalp outward. Lice are usually found at the back of the head or behind the ears.

Eggs (or nits) are oval-shaped, greyish white and can be seen firmly stuck to the base of hair shafts. They are easier to see because they greatly outnumber lice.

Care

Use a special shampoo, cream or lotion to kill the lice eggs. To get rid of them, use a fine tooth comb to carefully pick them out.

Wash your bedding and clothes in hot water. These items should probably be dried in a drying machine that reaches 54 degrees Celsius for about 30 minutes.

<u>Transmission</u>

Headlice are most common among children aged 5-II, but can affect almost anyone. The infestation is spread by close personal contact and possibly by shared combs, brushes, hats and other personal items.
