Dear Parents and Carers,

What a dismally wet week in school! Incredibly, it hasn't deterred us from being outside for break, lunchtime and our PE as normal! Our School Councillors for this year have embarked on a project to develop some play rules for OPAL on behalf of Mrs Sherry (who is joining School Council next week to go through what they have come up with in their classes).

On the note of OPAL, during an OPAL playtime, children are exploring, building and getting fully immersed in outdoor play, whether it is loose part play, using the mud kitchen, or yesterday - tennis! During this time of year, a lot of our grassy areas become saturated and 'welly only' zones. We now have our welly storage fully up and running, but there are still a lot of children without a pair of wellies in school. A gentle reminder to send some in if you haven't already, so that children can access all parts of our playtime offer, and play comfortably and confidently!

This year, some of our staff meetings are being delivered by the Sports Partnership and on Monday, the focus was gymnastics. This was a staff meeting with a difference...as 6 children came along to help demonstrate some of the activities and techniques - a huge thank you and congratulations to Arabella, Tilda, Olivia, Blake-Isla, Harry and Sydney who were amazing at helping to show the progression to forward rolls, backward rolls and cartwheels!

Staying with sport, some of our Year 5 and 6 children journeyed to William Brookes School in Much Wenlock on Wednesday to take part in an athletics event where they had to compete in events such as: sprint races, 'speed bounce', long jump, vertical jump, chest push, indoor javelin, relays and Paarluf running - which I've had to look up what it means! Speaking to Miss Humphries and Mrs Cook on return, the children's behaviour was (and I quote): "impeccable" - they came a very respectable 7th out of all the schools who were competing.

2026 is the national 'Year of Reading' due to a huge drop in the number of people nationally who are reading for pleasure. In school, our approach to teaching and promoting reading is a real strength and next week we will be launching the Year of Reading with the children; building on all the fantastic practice across school and really promoting the importance of linking what they are reading with their own interests (not just books as reading material).

Our Year 5s are currently taking part in an initiative called 'Bookfest', looking at a range of exciting texts by a range of authors and really getting under the skin of the content. Just around the corner of course is World Book Day at the start of March - please start thinking about costumes if pupils would like to dress up. As we have done in previous years, every single child in school will take home their chosen World Book Day book on the day!

A Quick Guide To Head Lice

Symptoms & Detection

The main symptom is an itchy scalp. Children may hardly notice head lice or may have only minor scalp irritation.



Move a fine tooth comb through wet hair from the scalp outward. Lice are usually found at the back of the head or behind the ears.

Eggs (or nits) are oval-shaped, greyish white and can be seen firmly stuck to the base of hair shafts. They are easier to see because they greatly outnumber lice.

Care

Use a special shampoo, cream or lotion to kill the lice eggs. To get rid of them, use a fine tooth comb to carefully pick them out.

Wash your bedding and clothes in hot water. These items should probably be dried in a drying machine that reaches 54 degrees Celsius for about 30 minutes.



Transmission

Headlice are most common among children aged 5-11, but can affect almost anyone. The infestation is spread by close personal contact and possibly by shared combs, brushes, hats and other personal items.
